



In 2000, Indian River County made the list of the 500 largest public school districts in the United States at 494th largest (Census, 2000). Specifically in Florida, Indian River County ranked 58th in the state for the total number of persons living in poverty (9.3%) and for those younger than age 5 living in poverty, the county ranked 47th with 17.3% of all young children living in poverty (Census, 2000). Early childhood teachers in this county have been steadily involved in the T.E.A.C.H. Early Childhood® program with 33 recipients in 2001 and to 44 in 2005.


